

## Domes dominating copper MOD's minds

JULIAN Hanna and the team at MOD Resources say they are absolute "obsessed" by domes, not altogether surprising given the success that's rapidly starting to unfold at the company's copper project in Botswana's Kalahari.

Stepping away from its mainstay T3 Dome that's under feasibility, MOD's drilling of the A4 Dome has had immediate success, hitting 52m grading 1.5% copper and 14gpt silver within a vein stockwork from 232.2m downhole depth.

That compares with the T3 discovery intercept in March 2016 that hit 52m at 2% copper and 32gpt silver, with that mineralisation (at T3) set to underpin a substantial copper mine that'll likely be producing in 2020.

Hanna, the MD of MOD, told the Diggers & Dealers mining forum in Kalgoorlie this week that the geology at the new discovery was unlike that at T3 - with there being 8km between the two domes.

"Which way it goes we don't know but we're about to find out," Hanna said.

"We are swamping this with drill rigs as we speak."

The company is also super keen this week to see what emerges from the A1 Dome - 26km from A1 - where drilling Friday intersected vein hosted bornite at 192m and visible mineralisation.

And then there's the T20 Dome that MOD wants to get to ASAP.

The exploration breakthrough in the Kalahari being employed by MOD is the use of airborne EM technology that's seeing through the cover.

MOD's feasibility for T3 is due for completion next March.

There's potentially a lot of news from the cashed-up MOD's "domes" before then.

"We live and breathe domes," Hanna said.

Shares in MOD were up nearly 14% to 50c in late trade, capitalising the company at \$116 million.
